





ANTHONY WAYNE MEMORIAL PROJECT UPDATE

The Compatriots of the Northwest Territory Chapter have moved to the final phase of the Wayne Veterans? memorial construction and installation phase. The Defiance Board of Control met and decided the location of the memorial. Mayor McCann met with David Lupien and they came to an agreement. The memorial will be placed along the Maumee River, west of the Defiance Public Library and original site of Fort Defiance at the corner of Wayne Avenue and Fort Street.

With this Memorial's location finally determined, we have moved to hiring an architect G5 Architecture of Archbold, Ohio. Rick Graber has taken on the duties of completing the site plan for city approval and then get us are state permit. Rich assures us this should be all done by end of April. This then allows us to get the excavating completed and forms in place to pour our foundation and sidewalks.

We at the same time have been working on the final proofing of the text and images to be placed on the memorial. Delphos Granite Works has all of he granite in shop now and we are in a good lace with them. We should have the proofs done by the end of March and this then gives them the ability to begin the layout and engraving and etching of the monument.

If we did not have enough to deal with, we have also had to get a good start on our dedication plans. Since we are applying for a 250th Anniversary grant for help with the dedication programs, we had to get some basic decisions made so as to know how much funding we would need. We finalized our programs we would like to attempt to carry out. And, we put together a two day

event that I think will make a very interesting and informative program and provide this event with the stature it deserves for all of our hard work in seeing it to fruition.


We are planning a two day event-Friday, August 23 we are planning to put a Speakers Symposium together. This will be an afternoon and evening program. We are attempting to get our venue finalized for this event. It has been a challenge but we believe we have a new prospect to get this over the finish line. More to come on this event soon.

Saturday, August 24 will see us dedicate the Wayne Veterans Memorial and give it to the people of Defiance, NW Ohio, the State of Ohio and the Nation. Woke be damned, we will take pride in honoring this Founding Father., Period! The service components are coming together and we will are hoping that in May we will be able to begin the official promotion and marketing of the event. We are planning for a mustering time of 8 am and stepping off the Flag procession at 9:20 am.

After the dedication, we are holding a luncheon for the public. Tickets will be limited to 250 and we will be hosting the event at the Defiance VFW Post 3360, just a block south and east of our memorial site. Likewise, we will have more coming on this event too, once we know our fate with the grant application and budgeting issues to be overcome.

SSGT JACK W. COY

703RD BOMBARDMENT SQUADRON 445TH BOMBARDMENT GROUP (HEAVY)

n September 20, 2023, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) identified the remains of Staff Sergeant Jack W. Coy, missing from World War II.

Staff Sergeant Coy entered the U.S. Army Air Forces from Ohio and served in the 703rd Bombardment Squadron, 403rd Bombardment Group. On February 24, 1944, he was the tail gunner aboard a B-24J Liberator (serial number 42-100312) which took off from its airbase in England, for a bombing mission against enemy targets near Gotha, Germany. During the mission, this aircraft sustained damage from an enemy fighter attack and exploded in mid-air near Bad Salzungen, Germany. Two crew members survived the attack, but the rest, including SSG Coy, were lost in the explosion. Post-war search efforts to find his remains were unsuccessful. In March 1952, the American Graves Registration Command (AGRC) took custody of commingled unidentified remains from Bad Salzungen Cemetery. Among them were remains belonging to several crewmembers from a bomber crash between Bad Salzungen and Leimbach-Kaiseroda. However, there was not enough evidence to warrant an individual or group identification, and they were ultimately interred in the Ardennes American Cemetery. In June 2021 these remains were disinterred and transferred to a DPAA Laboratory for further study. The laboratory analysis and the totality of the circumstantial evidence available established one set of these remains as those of SSG Coy.


Staff Sergeant Coy is memorialized on the Tablets of the Missing at the Henri-Chapelle American Cemetery in Hombourg, Belgium.



The 445th Bomb Group flew B-24 Liberators from Tibenham, Norfolk. The crews' first mission was bombing U-boat installations at Kiel on 13 December 1943. The Group continued to hit strategic targets in Germany, including the aircraft components factory at Gotha on 24 February 1944, during USAAF's Big Week of raids against the German aircraft industry, which earned the Group a Distinguished Unit Citation. THE IMPACT ON THE EFFECTIVENESS OF SAR'S VETERANS PROGRAMS

AN EXCERPT FROM AN ARTICLE IN THE 2024 WINTER EDITION OF THE SAR MAGAZINE BY MICHAEL E. WEYLER, PH D., VIRGINIA SOCIETY, SAR, CAPTAIN, CEC, USN (RET)

The mission of the NSSAR Veterans Committee is to direct the SAR's efforts to serve those who have helped us by overseeing many programs to encourage and recognize individuals, chapters and state-level societies in their support of veterans. The USS Stark Memorial report is the primary tool for monitoring SAR member activities in serving veterans.

The USS Stark Memorial Award is more than just an award. When societies and chapters submit the report, they provide information on their service to veterans. The Veterans Committee uses this information to determine the strengths and gaps in the SAR's veterans programs.

From the USS Stark Memorial Award Scoring Sheet: "The USS Stark Memorial Award, authorized in 1988 (revised 2003), was established to memorialize those brave men and women who continue to stand at the forefront to preserve the freedoms our patriotic ancestors fought so long and hard to achieve. Its purpose is to recognize outstanding chapters and the most outstanding state society within the NSSAR for their participation with the Veteran community and supporting activities of the NSSAR Veteran's Committee."

The NSSAR Veterans Committee manages the USS Stark Memorial Award Scoring Sheet, available for download from sar.org. The scoring sheet has 14 sections in which a chapter can report its activities in support of veterans.

These veteran support activities include support at VA hospitals, visits and outings with individual veterans, and donations to veterans. Participating in and supporting veterans' funerals is one area where activities such as reading, dedication, bugling and pallbearing can earn a significant chapter credit for veterans support, including recognition for miles traveled to the funerals. For the funeral of an Active Duty Veteran Killed in Action, which is the case for each of these DPAA recently accounted-for veterans, the credit for participation is doubled.

The level of involvement of the SAR in the burial ceremo-

nies varies depending on the family's wishes. In some instances, the SAR provided the color guard for the ceremony, while in others, the SAR members lined the route to the burial site wearing their full uniforms and bearing flags. At other times, the SAR members attended the ceremony as an expression of honor toward the veteran. Although we have sent more than 100 notices of USS Stark Memorial Award opportunities, we have received feedback from fewer than 25. Those chapters which report having attended, or are planning to attend, are encouraged to generate reports and photos of the events for inclusion in the State Society & Chapter Events section of the SAR

Magazine. We know of at least one chapter that has submitted such a report with a photo. Hopefully, we will gather more feedback from the USS Stark Memorial Award Reports that we encourage each chapter and society to submit at year's end.

So, has there been any impact so far on the nationwide use of the USS Stark Memorial Award Program? The statistics concerning those 100 reburials identified this year are instructive and encouraging. In 2020, only 16 of our SAR state societies submitted USS Stark Memorial Award Reports.

In other words, the majority of state societies failed to make any contribution to that program.

The 100 identified MIAs are being reburied across 37states, 22 of which failed to report any USS Stark activity in 2020, either at the state or chapter level. Hopefully, the

Veterans Committee notices, and DPAA news releases sent to these 22 new states encouraging participation in the program will be like a seed planted in new ground that will increase national interest in this growing part of our service to veterans as we approach our nation's 250th anniversary.

VETERANS SITREP

The Veterans Affairs Committee urges all veteran compatriots to submit a NSSAR Veterans Multi Corps Recognition Form which will allow the compatriot to be recognized and issued a Certificate of Patriotism. This allows the purchasing of the War Service Medal or the Military Service Medal by the compatriot or compatriot's chapter.

If you are a veteran that has not been recognized by the NSSAR Veterans Recognition Committee and want to receive your Certificate of Patriotism, please contact your chapter president, chapter veterans committee chairman, or myself to get that process started.

I encourage all Ohio Society chapters to fill out and submit a USS Stark Memorial Award report for 2024. The purpose of this report is to recognize SAR chapters for their support of and service to the veteran community.

Partners in Patriotism is now reported annually on the USS Stark Memorial Award report. This encourages and recognizes chapters who participate in veterans programs sponsored and organized by other patriotic organizations such as the Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion, USO, Wreaths Across America, Honor Flight, Blue Star Salute, etc.

The Ohio Society had sixteen chapters submit a USS Stark Memorial report for 2023. That was a 67 percent submission rate. We needed a 50 percent submission rate for the society to receive the State Veterans Service Award at this year's SAR Congress.

Their names will be added to the their respective campaign SAR Service Corps.



FROM THE PRESIDENT'S LIBRARY

If you ever wondered what it might have been like to be a soldier in our War for Independence from Great Britain then, read this narrative by Joseph Plumb Martin!

For those that have had the privilege of serving our country in uniform during times of war, you may find parallel experiences shared with Private Martin.

This story of his experiences during the Revolution is fascinating as well as a truthful sharing of his journey from life as a British Subject to that of an American Citizen!




wide-eyed teenager during most of the Revolutionary War, Joseph Plumb Martin left his grandfather's farm in Connecticut in 1775 and spent much of the next eight years with the Continental Army, crisscrossing the mid-Atlantic states and returning north after the British surrender at Yorktown. His notes, penned when he was seventy, recount in grim detail his harrowing experiences during the conflict — the staggering losses in human life, the agony of long marches, constant gnawing hunger, bitter cold, and the fear of battle, as well as a warts-andall view of military leaders. Balancing these brutal wartime experiences are lively accounts of hunting, fishing, and other diversions--including an occasional encounter with a "saucy miss."

The fullest existing description of the Revolutionary War by an enlisted man, and a rediscovered gem of American history, Martin's recollections brim with telling anecdotes that reveal a great deal about American life during this era.
